The next time attention turned to the Lakotas was on April 1, 1890, when the newspapers reported that the Lakotas were gathering to hold a great council and to dance None of the papers, however, mentioned the ghost dance In fact, the papers reported that the Lakotas were dancing their last war dance or holding their last powwow
